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

Council annual giving campaign. The funds that we raise through this campaign go to the maintenance of Camp Shenandoah, the Council's greatest physical asset. Last year we visited over


90% of our units and raised over \$100,000. Our goal this year is to visit all the units in the Council.



### **COUNCIL HISTORY**

The first council in the area was the **Staunton** Council, formed in 1921. The Stonewall Jackson Council was organized in Waynesboro, Virginia in 1927. The Council was named after General Stonewall Jackson, one of the most famous residents of the area. The Lewis & Clark Council was formed in Charlottesville in 1927; in 1931, it was consolidated into the Stonewall Jackson Council. The council was later renamed to the **Stonewall Jackson Area** Council. In November 2019 the Council Board voted to change it's name to Virginia **Headwaters Council** to represent the geographical area. This Council is home to the spring-waters of all 4 of the great rivers of Virginia and NE West Virginia that enter the sea directly out of Virginia. The James, York, Rappahannock, and Potomac Rivers all rise in our beloved council territory. No other place on earth is home to these headwaters. The first Scout executive was J.W. Fix who served from 1927 to 1950. Fix had joined Scouting as a youth in 1911 and

was an Eagle Scout.



### YOUR COUNCIL CHAPLAIN

Another of the more memorable visitors to my Citizenship merit badge classes was another volunteer from the National Capital Area Council. He mentioned that he was an Eagle Scout and a pilot in the Air Force. He visited my class and talked about the ways his experiences in Scouting helped prepare him for his career.

After aging out, he attended the prestigious United States Air Force Academy and cut his teeth as a young pilot. He climbed the ranks over the years and gained the attention of superiors with his work ethic and talent. Now, he told the class, he flew one of the most sophisticated jets in the world. At that time he was the pilot of Air Force Two, which meant he was the person who flew the Vice President of the United States around the world. This sort of job is one sought after by many as it is something that very few Air Force pilots will ever get to experience. There is no doubt that his time in Scouting guided him to become the sort of pilot, officer, and person that would be chosen to take on this important job.

Scouting isn't going to guarantee you the sort of prestige that this man achieved, but it is an experience that can give you the tools to reach a level of success that will give you a leg up among your peers. Enjoy the adventure and let it provide you with the guidance to be the most healthy, happy, and helpful member of our society that you can be. That was the vision of Lord Robert Baden-Powell when he started this movement.





# Youth Protection Corner: Adult Leadership and Scout Buddies for Joint Troop/Pack Events

Your Scouts BSA Troop is planning a recruiting hike with Webelos and AOLs from four different Packs, with one Scout attending from each unit. So how many registered adult leaders do you need to satisfy Youth Protection Training (YPT) requirements? YPT "best practice" would say two registered adult leaders from every unit (including a female leader for any female units) which would seem to indicate you need TEN registered adult leaders for a hike with FIVE Scouts. But wait, can your guests be covered by the Troop leadership or do they absolutely need their own 2-deep leadership from each Pack? Hold on, it gets even more complicated - in addition to providing appropriate adult leadership, how do you meet the buddy/gender requirements for mixed groups of Scouts from different units of various ages? It's enough to make you give up!

Navigating the maze of YPT rules can feel very overwhelming and make joint event planning quite challenging. So, how do you figure out the minimum "go / no-go" requirements for joint events to make sure you're covered - or if you need to cancel the event? Just use the handy-dandy table below as guidance for your events (and be sure to read/adhere to all the notes underneath), and then check out the next table for some common examples! These reflect the latest guidance, including AOL/Troop Camporee participation and Troop sibling camping rules.

a registered female adult leader over age 21 is ALWAYS required if female Scouts are attending, AND

a multiple-registered adult leader cannot serve as the leader for multiple units at the same event (i.e. must pick one and only one)

Note 1: All adult campers must have valid and current Youth Protection Training status

Note 2: For AOL camping with Troops, non-leader AOL parents CAN camp overnight but cannot count as a leader. All camping AOL/Pack leaders must be registered to that Pack.

Note 3: For Troop camping (at all times), non-leader parents and either adults or Scout siblings not registered to that Troop (e.g. adult MBCs and little sisters) CANNOT camp overnight.

Note 4: For AOL camping with Troops at Scouts BSA Camporees (e.g. Apple Harvest, Woods with Merit), either the AOL Den can provide 2-deep leadership, OR parent/guardian can attend with AOL and Council can coordinate and approve GtSS appropriate 2-deep leadership (e.g. from host Troop or otherwise). Also note that camporee organizers should plan to have age/skill-appropriate and GtSS-appropriate activities so that AOLs can participate in most events with their host Troop.

Note 5: For applying pair or triplet "buddy system" during day events, Pack Scout(s) can buddy with Pack/Troop Scout(s) of same gender and within 3 years of age, or Pack Scouts can buddy with attending parent/guardian. All attending Scouts must have a GtSS-appropriate buddy in order to attend.

Note 6: For applying pair or triplet "buddy system" during tenting for overnight events, AOL Scout(s) can tent with AOL/Troop Scout(s) of same gender and within 2 years of age, or AOL Scouts can tent with attending parent/guardian.

If more than one unit is participating in an activity, a good rule of thumb is to think to yourself, "if one of my adult leaders has to leave, does every participating unit still have appropriate coverage for the event?" Another little-known requirement is that if your Troop is planning an overnight event with a Pack from a different Charter Organization, you must also get your plans approved by Council <u>before</u> your event.

Keep in mind, both Youth Protection and the Guide to Safe Scouting (GtSS) are like the weather: always changing! These tables are compliant with both as of October 2024, but make sure you check the latest online version at <a href="https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss">www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss</a>, not that trusty 2022 printed guide that's sitting on your bookshelf. Also, check the YPT FAQ pages for extra clarity.

ALBEMARLE COUNTY, Va. (WVIR) - A Boy Scouts of America troop out of Ivy, Va., now has its very first female Eagle Scout.

It's the highest rank in the Scouts, which only opened up to girls a few years ago.

In its two-and-a-half years of existence, Troop 3125 had never had a girl reach the rank of Eagle Scout. But then, 18 -year-old Emerson Ter Borg changed that.

"In my years of scouting, I didn't see any activity that I had to do that was like, wow, I can't do this because of my gender," said Emerson.

In late September, Emerson got the call.

"I didn't even listen to the rest of the explanation," Emerson said. "All I heard was, alright, you're an Eagle Scout, and I was like, my brain's checked out."

Erika Priddy, Scoutmaster for Troop 3125, says Scouts typically start at about 10 years old, and have about seven years to earn their Eagle rank. Because Scouts only opened to girls in 2019, Emerson had to do it much faster.

"For her, it was just an accelerated [track]," Priddy said. "I think it required even more of that determination for her to get it done. So that's really impressive."

Emerson's mother, Julie Ter Borg, said she was proud but never surprised.

"Emerson is an anomaly," Julie said. "She's incredible. She's the one who comes home and goes straight to work. She would come home, go straight to her homework, then, you know, come out of her room and ask if she had any chores. I think she's the only teenager that asks for chores."

The final step in becoming an Eagle Scout is completing a project that improves the community. Emerson turned to a place close to her heart: the Crozet Library.

"I've always loved reading, I'm a book nerd," Emerson said. "So, I kind of wanted to have my Eagle project do something with both communities that I really have benefited from, to try and give back a little."

After a lot of hard work, and a lot of paperwork, that idea transformed into a Little Free Library.

"What I really liked about her project is that she didn't necessarily pick it because that's what she wanted to do," Priddy said. "She spoke to the library, knew she wanted to do something that would benefit them, and that's what they asked for. That's what they wanted."

Once you become an Eagle Scout, you wear that honor for the rest of your life. Julie says for her daughter, that goes beyond a medal or a badge.

"As a female, it's hard to speak up for yourself," Julie said. "Many times, it's sad. I hate saying that, but it's true...Scouts empowered her, and that's what I'm so excited about."

Emerson, now a student at UVA Wise, says Troop 3125 hasn't seen the last of her. She plans to come back as a counselor and possibly join the Order of the Arrow, Scouting's National Honor Society.

"There were a few guys who did say things like, 'Go back to Girl Scouts,'" Emerson said. "But I'm just not going to take that stuff anymore. I'm not going to let it bother me."

Note: All registrations are for 12 months. For example, if your current registration expires on 12/31/2023, your renewed membership will start on 1/1/2024 and run through the entire calendar year until 12/31/2024. Membership renewal can be completed by either the individual, the family or the unit.

### Auto Renewal Membership Family/Self Pay


- An email notification and a renewal link will be sent 60 days before membership expires.
- The link provided in the email will direct individuals to a renewal form on My.Scouting
- If registered in multiple positions, select the primary position. Renewing the primary position will automatically renew multiple positions.
- The individual pays with a credit card and submits the renewal.
- The unit will approve the membership renewal.

# Auto Renewal Membership Unit Pay


- In Organization Manager, the unit selects the Unit Pay option.
- Unit Key 3s are notified each month about which members are due to renew that month.
- Using the Roster tab, the unit selects which members they are renewing.
- The unit can choose not to renew a member (opt-out). The unit can also change the Scout's Life subscription settings for each person.
- The unit pays with a credit card or establishes a securely stored electronic fund transfer payment (ACH) and submits the renewal.

Unit Key3 can find out which memberships have **expired** or are **due to renew**, then **batch** and **approve** any **Membership Renewals** in <u>my.scouting.org</u> under Organization Manager/Roster.
