

YOUR COUNCIL CHAPLAIN

My time at Camp Shenandoah was filled with many occurrences that highlighted the value and importance of Scouting. This was once again kicked off by the opening meeting of Scoutmasters where I asked for those willing to come and speak to my citizenship merit badge classes; especially those that were Eagle Scouts. One such volunteer agreed and came to speak with the class about his owning an auto repair shop.

When he spoke to the class he talked about how it was his dream to own a shop like that one day and how his experiences in Scouting prepared him for this. The Scouts all asked lots of questions about his business and his experiences while the adults all had to remain in the back, as I insisted. One of the adults paced around during this session and seemed rather irritated.

After that class, he approached me. He told me that the speaker was inappropriate and had nothing to do with the merit badge. I replied that this Scouter was discussing his American Dream. That his owning the shop was as important of a duty and obligation as a citizen as other jobs. As the angry adult admitted, "of course" he drove his car to camp to get there. Everyone has a part to play, and this man's dream was to own his auto shop. The importance of your role in society is not based on the perceived prestige others may hold for it.

Advanced Leadership Training: NYLT and Wood Badge

Scouting America offers two premier advanced leadership training programs—National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) for youth and Wood Badge for adult leaders. These programs are designed to cultivate strong leadership skills, ensuring that Scouts and their leaders are well-prepared to lead and inspire others.

National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT). NYLT is a week-long immersive course tailored for youth Scouts, typically between the ages of 13 and 18. This advanced training program focuses on:

- **Leadership Skills**: Teaching essential skills such as communication, planning, problem-solving, and team-building.
- **Practical Experience**: Offering hands-on, experiential learning opportunities where Scouts can practice and refine their leadership abilities.

Wood Badge equips adult leaders with the tools and insights needed to support and mentor youth effectively, ensuring that the principles and methods of Scouting are upheld and promoted at all levels. Graduates of Wood Badge return to their units with renewed enthusiasm, ready to lead by example and inspire the next generation of Scouts.



Youth Protection Corner: Adult Leadership and Scout Buddies for Joint Troop/Pack Events

Your Scouts BSA Troop is planning a recruiting hike with Webelos and AOLs from four different Packs, with one Scout attending from each unit. So how many registered adult leaders do you need to satisfy Youth Protection Training (YPT) requirements? YPT "best practice" would say two registered adult leaders from every unit (including a female leader for any female units) which would seem to indicate you need TEN registered adult leaders for a hike with FIVE Scouts. But wait, can your guests be covered by the Troop leadership or do they absolutely need their own 2-deep leadership from each Pack? Hold on, it gets even more complicated - in addition to providing appropriate adult leadership, how do you meet the buddy/gender requirements for mixed groups of Scouts from different units of various ages? It's enough to make you give up!

Navigating the maze of YPT rules can feel very overwhelming and make joint event planning quite challenging. So, how do you figure out the minimum "go / no-go" requirements for joint events to make sure you're covered - or if you need to cancel the event? Just use the handy-dandy table below as guidance for your events (and be sure to read/adhere to all the notes underneath), and then check out the next table for some common examples! These reflect the latest guidance, including AOL/Troop Camporee participation and Troop sibling camping rules.

a multiple-registered adult leader cannot serve as the leader for multiple units at the same event (i.e. must pick one and only one)

Note 1: All adult campers must have valid and current Youth Protection Training status

Note 2: For AOL camping with Troops, non-leader AOL parents CAN camp overnight but cannot count as a leader. All camping AOL/Pack leaders must be registered to that Pack.

Note 3: For Troop camping (at all times), non-leader parents and either adults or Scout siblings not registered to that Troop (e.g. adult MBCs and little sisters) CANNOT camp overnight.

Note 4: For AOL camping with Troops at Scouts BSA Camporees (e.g. Apple Harvest, Woods with Merit), either the AOL Den can provide 2-deep leadership, OR parent/guardian can attend with AOL and Council can coordinate and approve GtSS appropriate 2-deep leadership (e.g. from host Troop or otherwise). Also note that camporee organizers should plan to have age/skill-appropriate and GtSS-appropriate activities so that AOLs can participate in most events with their host Troop.

Note 5: For applying pair or triplet "buddy system" during day events, Pack Scout(s) can buddy with Pack/Troop Scout(s) of same gender and within 3 years of age, or Pack Scouts can buddy with attending parent/guardian. All attending Scouts must have a GtSS-appropriate buddy in order to attend.

Note 6: For applying pair or triplet "buddy system" during tenting for overnight events, AOL Scout(s) can tent with AOL/Troop Scout(s) of same gender and within 2 years of age, or AOL Scouts can tent with attending parent/guardian.

Acronyms: AOL = Arrow of Light, BALOO = Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation, COR = Charter Organization Representative, GtSS = Guide to Safe Scouting (always check the latest on-line at www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss), HWT = Hazardous Weather Training, IOLS = Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills, SA = Scouting America (formerly BSA)

If more than one unit is participating in an activity, a good rule of thumb is to think to yourself, "if one of my adult leaders has to leave, does every participating unit still have appropriate coverage for the event?" Another little-known requirement is that if your Troop is planning an overnight event with a Pack from a different Charter Organization, you must also get your plans approved by Council <u>before</u> your event.

Keep in mind, both Youth Protection and the Guide to Safe Scouting (GtSS) are like the weather: always changing! These tables are compliant with both as of October 2024, but make sure you check the latest online version at www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss, not that trusty 2022 printed guide that's sitting on your bookshelf. Also, check the YPT FAQ pages for extra clarity.
